



A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

For nearly 50 years, the Autism Society of North Carolina (ASNC) has improved the lives of individuals with autism, supported their families, and educated our communities about the needs and contributions of people with autism. Together with our donors and volunteers, we have enabled individuals with autism across the state to lead fulfilling lives.

Each of you is an important part of our family, and we want to thank you for the many contributions you have made to our community. Your leadership, devotion, and generous financial support have enabled ASNC to continue to create innovative programs to provide vital services and supports.

All individuals with autism are an important part of our future. Together, we will build communities that respect and value our loved ones with autism and provide them with the opportunities to reach their goals and dreams.

This year, we have taken major steps toward meeting the needs of adults with autism. Individuals with autism spend many more years as adults than as children. They are lifelong learners but often need support to enroll in post-secondary education, find and keep fulfilling employment, and build a peer network.

First, we tapped into the expertise of statewide leaders with decades of experience to lead our efforts. With their leadership and the support of Trillium Health Resources, we launched transition to adulthood programs in Wilmington and Greenville. The programs focus on job readiness, job development, and job placement and support. At the same time, the young adults learn the soft skills required for success on the job, including organization, social roles, time management, and more. Partners in those local communities – both companies and other organizations – are providing real-life experience for participants. These young men and women are feeling fulfilled and showing their communities how they can contribute.

Our second IGNITE program opened in Raleigh in fall 2018. Building on seven years of success in the Davidson location, IGNITE Raleigh is creating an environment where young adults with autism are able to develop their social, problem-solving, and independent-living skills. For example, a young man came to IGNITE in 2017 after becoming increasingly isolated after finishing high school. He was living with his elderly parents with nothing to do: no job, no schooling, no friends. Over several months at IGNITE, he opened up to staff, built friendships with his peers in the program, and set goals. He began eating healthier, applying for jobs, and going out with friends. Today, he is working, owns a car, and is making plans to live on his own. "IGNITE is very important to me, because it's helped me grow in many ways," he said.

LifeLong Interventions (LLI), our intensive treatment program that serves adults on the autism spectrum as well as children, continues to grow and now serves more than 120 individuals in five locations. One recent success was an adult with autism improving his communication skills so that he is now able to communicate his wants and needs. We are grateful to Gregg and Lori Ireland and the Ireland Family Foundation for their continued generosity. Their support has been critical to creating a state-of-the-art Clinical Program for individuals with autism.

Regardless of where you or your loved one is on the spectrum or phase of life, the Autism Society of North Carolina is here for you. We have an incredible team of individuals on the spectrum, their families, our communities, and the Autism Society of North Carolina staff members.

We are partners for a lifetime.



RICO THORPE

When Rico first came to Camp Royall as a 5-year-old, he had limited verbal skills, but he had a lot of joy. He clearly loved being at camp and made friends quickly. Over the years, Rico returned to Camp Royall time after time. We watched him grow up, building on his communication skills each year.

Rico shared with us that his dream was to work for Camp Royall someday. At first, he volunteered in the kitchen and with some cleaning. But Rico really wanted to be a counselor, supporting other individuals on the spectrum. He learned how to talk to parents and write daily notes so that he could work with the day camp. His confidence and self-esteem grew.

Now, Rico brings his enthusiasm to work as a full-time counselor at Camp Royall all year long. He also is moving out of his family's home to live independently. The scholarships that Rico received to attend camp as a child helped not only him, but dozens of other campers as he shows them what heights they can reach.

IMPROVING LIVES

CREDIT SUISSE

Credit Suisse, a multinational financial services company, has a hub in Research Triangle Park (RTP), in the center of North Carolina. For more than seven years, the company has been a consistent and dedicated partner of the Autism Society of North Carolina, improving lives through volunteer hours and donations totaling more than \$100,000.

In the past year, Credit Suisse went a step further to directly improve lives. The company launched a neurodiversity program, aimed at integrating individuals on the autism spectrum into their workforce. Studies show that as many as eight out of 10 individuals with autism are unemployed or underemployed. Meaningful employment increases self-esteem and self-worth. A job provides the independence that comes with a paycheck as well as opportunities to improve social skills, grow a network of friends and support, and pursue passions.

For many individuals on the spectrum, it is the "soft skills" of interviewing and networking that keep them out of the workplace. Credit Suisse worked with the Autism Society of North Carolina to adjust its interview process and support new employees on the spectrum as they transition into the workplace.

To date, several applicants on the autism spectrum have been hired into the bank's neurodiversity apprenticeship program, and two have already been converted to permanent employees. "We are already seeing true business value from the diversity of thought, skills and experiences these candidates bring," Ro Lissenden, Director of IT.

AUTISM RESOURCE SPECIALISTS

For many parents who have children with autism, it can be difficult to prioritize self-care when their children need so much time and attention. ASNC Autism Resource Specialists are there for these parents, not only helping them to find support for their children, but also reminding them to take care of themselves.

Amy Perry, an Autism Resource Specialist in ASNC's southern region, helped turn things around for Jane, a single mom from Moore County. Jane was in crisis when she came to Amy for help. Her son's challenging behavior had escalated. Tom was only attending school for half days, and even then, he required four supervising adults. Jane had been forced to quit her job, and she had made the wrenching decision to find a placement out of the home for him.

Amy helped Jane find crisis services and support for her son. Amy connected them with Camp Royall, and Tom was able to attend the spring break camp. Not only did that provide a chance for Jane to take care of herself, but Tom had a fantastic time and came home a "different child," Jane said. Now, Tom is doing better in school, and they have been able to fade out some of the extra support.

Jane has also become involved in her local ASNC Chapter and is making self-care a priority. She tells other parents how much taking care of herself has helped Tom and how important it is to be connected to the autism community, for both parents and children.

SUPPORTING FAMILIES

COVELLI ENTERPRISES

Covelli Enterprises has given \$74,000 in the past two years to support individuals with autism and their families. The funds were raised through the sale of special puzzle piece shortbread cookies at the company's Panera Bread locations during April, which is Autism Awareness and Acceptance Month. The Paneras that participated in the Pieces of Hope fundraiser were in Asheville, Boone, Burlington, Clemmons, Greensboro, High Point, Kernersville, Mooresville, Salisbury, Hickory, and Winston-Salem. Proceeds supported Autism Resource Specialists in those communities, program supplies, JobTIPS, trainings for families, conference scholarships, and more.

Part of the donation helped one Guilford County family immensely. When Kat's employment situation changed last year, she wasn't sure she could afford to keep sending her son to the Autism Society of North Carolina's afterschool program in Greensboro. The Covelli funds provided a scholarship. "I'm very appreciate of the support," Kat said. "It's been a long journey, and they've been quite helpful in my son growing into the nice young man he is."

Paneras employees also visited the Greensboro afterschool and day programs to get to know participants and join them in activities.

We also work to increase understanding and acceptance of people with autism in the community, ensuring that they are treated with dignity and their unique talents are valued.


Community outreach through trainings, social media, publications, and events to increase awareness and promote inclusion for all.

IGNITE DAVIDSON MEMBERS

The members of IGNITE Davidson are helping to ensure the safety of people with autism and first responders. At IGNITE, young adults with high-functioning autism or Asperger's Syndrome work toward financial, educational, and employment success through educational groups and activities.

This year, members of the IGNITE program assisted ASNC staff in the making of a video to educate first responders such as police, sheriff's deputies, firefighters, and EMTs about people with autism. The video also provides first responders with strategies for interactions to keep them from escalating into negative situations. The young adults acted out realistic scenarios to help illustrate important points as well as sharing their personal experiences. The video was produced with the support of the Jack Fanning Memorial Foundation and is part of ASNC training available to first responders.

"In today's society, autism awareness is an essential tool as law enforcement agencies strive to achieve public safety ideals in partnership with an increasingly diverse citizenry," said Durham Police Chief Cerelyn "CJ" Davis.

The members also built positive relationships with local law enforcement officers by engaging them in conversations about autism, inviting them to IGNITE events, and volunteering with their holiday giving program.

The IGNITE members are building a better community for all.

EDUCATING COMMUNITIES

ENLOE HIGH SCHOOL

Each year, the students of Enloe High School in Raleigh choose a nonprofit organization to support for a project that includes fundraising and volunteering. In 2018, the Autism Society of North Carolina was incredibly fortunate to be the beneficiary. The student leaders dedicated their efforts to helping launch IGNITE Raleigh for young adults with high-functioning autism or Asperger's Syndrome.

THE STUDENTS SET A LOFTY GOAL: \$200,000. THEY BEAT THAT, RAISING \$205,000.

In addition to providing financial support, the Enloe students raised autism awareness in their community. They offered presentations to other school clubs and posted autism awareness materials around the school. They ran campaigns on social media. The week before the big reveal, artwork on living with autism by Enloe students hung at VAE Raleigh, a downtown gallery. Student groups also gave live performances of improv, a cappella singing, and dance.

One of the most exciting parts of Enloe Charity Ball was that all of the students learned so much about people on the spectrum. Once IGNITE opened, they visited often, participating in classes and social events. They became friends with members. "It's not just about the money," said Sanjana Tharuvesanchi, Vice President of Public Relations. "It's about us interacting with the community that we're giving back to."
